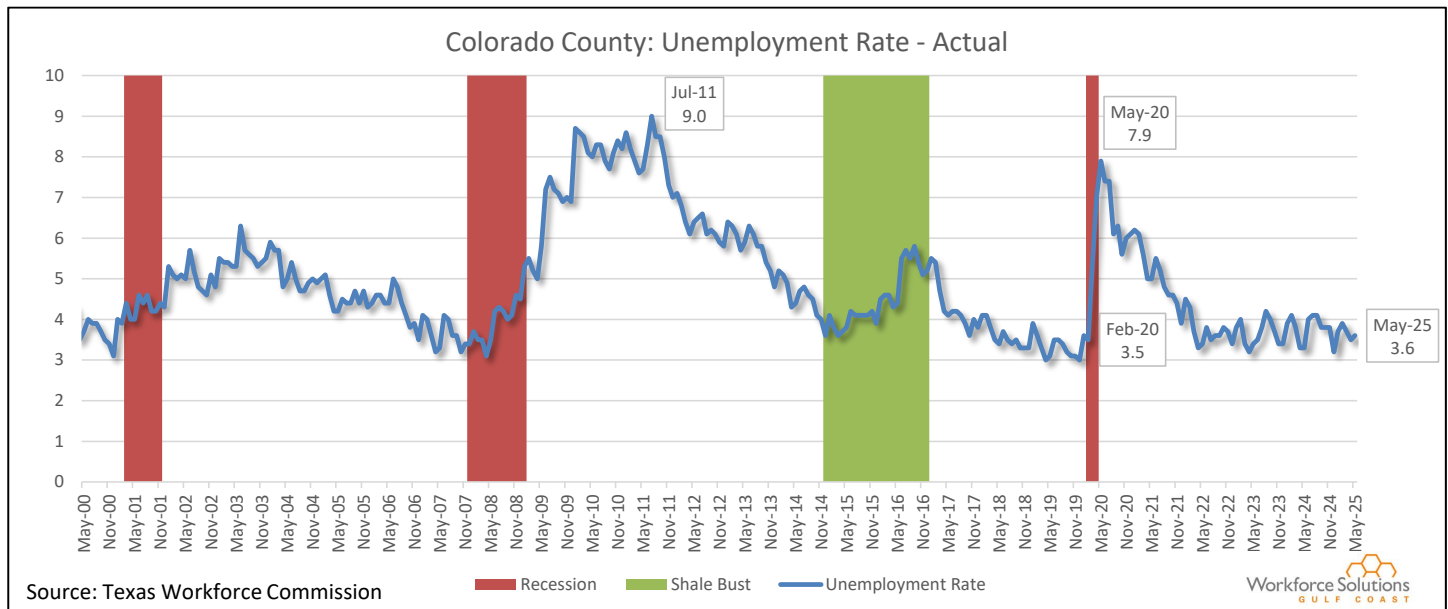

County Employment Data*

Colorado County reported the lowest unemployment rate among the 13 counties in the Gulf Coast region, ticking up 0.1 percentage point to 3.6% in May. Despite the increase, the rate remained 0.3 percentage points higher than the same time last year, yet still below both the state and national averages, which stood at 4.0%. Colorado County saw a decline of 87 covered jobs in the fourth quarter of 2024, a decrease of 1.2%. While job losses are typical for the quarter, the decline was milder than the historical average of 2.1%. Leisure and Hospitality accounted for the majority of the loss, driven by seasonal employment declines at a local water park and campground. However, a seasonal gain of 127 jobs in Local Government (up 13.8%) helped offset overall losses. The county recorded its fourth consecutive year-over-year employment decline in the fourth quarter, down 68 jobs. However, the pace of decline continued to improve, easing to 0.9% from 4.2% in the third quarter. Manufacturing remained the primary source of annual job loss, down 93 jobs or 7.3%. Additional declines were reported in Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (down 69 jobs or 4.4%), Construction (down 31 jobs or 5.8%), and Natural Resources and Mining (down 38 jobs or 6.9%). Despite these losses, several sectors experienced growth. The largest gains came from Education and Health Services (up 44 jobs or 4.5%) and Professional and Business Services (up 38 jobs or 17.9%). In the public sector, Local Government added 47 jobs, an increase of 4.7%. Additional details can be found pages 2 through 7.

Employment is the estimate of employment based upon the sample, not the sample employment. Wages for the OES survey are straight-time, gross pay, exclusive of premium pay. Base rate, cost-of-living allowances, guaranteed pay, hazardous-duty pay, incentive pay including commissions and production bonuses, tips, and on-call pay are included. Excluded are back pay, jury duty pay, overtime pay, severance pay, shift differentials, nonproduction bonuses, employer cost of supplementary benefits, and tuition reimbursements. **The Gulf Coast Region is defined as Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharton Counties.
