Teacher Apprenticeship Funding Resources

This document outlines a range of funding streams that can be strategically braided to support the successful implementation and long-term sustainability of teacher apprenticeship programs. As the primary resource and strategic lead of the workforce that includes teachers, and Local Education Agencies (LEAs) we are uniquely positioned to lead these investments, recognizing that building a strong, diverse teacher pipeline is a critical investment in the future of their schools and communities.

While LEAs play a central role, leveraging multiple funding sources ensures the apprenticeship model remains financially sustainable and accessible. By braiding funds, programs can offer aspiring educators a low-cost or even no-cost pathway to enter the profession, helping to remove financial barriers that often prevent individuals, particularly those from underrepresented backgrounds, from pursuing a teaching or education career.

The following section highlights several examples of potential funding sources, including both federal and state resources. This list is not exhaustive and should be reviewed regularly, as funding opportunities and legislative priorities continue to evolve.
